Following graduation from high school, she attended Teachers College, which firmly laid the foundation for a professional career in teaching and Education, in conjunction with further years of university studies, culminating in a Masters in Library Science. Her passion for teaching saw her transcend from elementary grades to district itinerant teacher-librarian, shared among schools, and onward to the

district office level, where her skills and experience in library services and technology provided her with an opportunity to share her wealth of knowledge among colleagues and schools, as well as the Department of Education (DOE), in her role as District Supervisor of Technology and School Libraries, in ED16 (now ASD-N). This award had been presented, annually, at the ED16 Creative Use of Technology Awards ceremony (CUTE Awards) which, unfortunately, no longer is in effect.

Retirement has not diminished Marjorie's interests or roles at all. In fact, one would wonder where she will fit anything else into her weekly and monthly agendas, as she remains incredibly active serving on numerous committees, with various groups and organizations, at the local level and beyond. She serves on The Friends of Beaubear's Island Historical Group Board of Directors and Finance Committee; as Chair of the Chatham



(Miramichi) Library Board of Directors; and Delta Kappa Gamma: International Society of Key Women Educators (DKG). She also is actively involved with the MARTA Branch of NBSRT, having recently spent the past

number of months actively engaged in attempting to compile and catalogue any existing historical documents of the MARTA Branch for the Provincial Archives, dating from the branch's inception in 1976. This is a time consuming but tremendously important project to the members of MARTA and having Marjorie and her expertise as chairperson of this initiative bodes well for its outcome.

Just as Marjorie has been highly esteemed during her professional years of experience, so too, she also has earned the same level of respect and admiration from the various organizations with which she has been involved, during the years following her retirement.

One noteworthy and remarkable example among many is the fact that during the month of July 2020, she was inducted into a new role in Delta Kappa Gamma, as the Regional Representative of Canada. This event had to be conducted virtually via Zoom, due to the current



pandemic. That, in itself, is no small feat and will involve additional, extensive responsibilities and duties, all of which she looks forward to with eagerness and anticipation. Just as with all commitments she has undertaken, Marjorie will be certain to complete her responsibilities with excellence, as she always leads through fine example. A priority throughout her career and now has been to serve as a strong, exemplary advocate equal of opportunity for all in education and employment opportunities, especially for minority groups, the underprivileged, young girls and women. Such attributes certainly make her a superior choice by DKG, for her new and important international role, within the organization. As an international organization, DKG has members from seventeen countries. Its intended mission is to promote professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education. This is further emphasized in its vision statement: Leading Women Educators Impacting Education Worldwide. A current and prominent program of DKG in Canada is the ArtsCan Circle, whereby the organization sponsors and sends teams of indigenous and non-indigenous musicians and artists to engage children and youth in northern indigenous communities in creative arts workshops. Marjorie is both proud and enthusiastic about this project and others of equal importance, which will be certain to follow.

Among personal interests, Marjorie has a keen interest in history and family genealogy, as evidenced in her very comprehensive completion of lineages for both sides of her family. Her records and charting of information are enviably admirable. This is an ongoing project for her and remains one to which she will continue to dedicate herself, with a keen interest. Undoubtedly, her sincere teaching skills have evoked this level of curiosity and involvement among extended family.
